Because of the difficulties it had to overcome in the early years of its existence, this historic day is a matter of deep rejoicing to all of us who are associated in any way with this University which was conceived by Dr. Roy as part of his comprehensive, coordinated scheme for the political, social, economic and educational development of our Northern districts which, following the partition, had unfortunately, over a decade, been isolated from the rest of West Bengal. With the prophetic vision that made him truly the creator of modern Bengal, Dr. Roy had realised that all these plans of development would fail to serve any useful and enduring purpose unless adequate academic facilities for higher education and research were provided to fulfil the growing needs of the people of the hill areas and plains of Darjeeling, Jalpaiguri, Cooch Behar, West Dinajpur and Malda.

It is my hope that this University, situated in the foothills of the ancient Himalayas, will evolve into a centre of national integration for all the peoples of different ethnic origins who live in these districts-the people of the hills and the plains including the tribal people.
